

Curriculum Overview:

During the first year of GCSE Art, Year 10 students will complete the first Unit of coursework, exploring the theme of 'Surfaces'. The title is broad, enabling students the freedom to develop their own individual expression as young artists.

The unit equates to 30% of their overall GCSE grade and each lesson is considered to be controlled assessment which contributes entirely to their Art Coursework.

Homework & Assessments Overview:

Homework should be for a minimum of 1-2hrs, every week and will be ongoing development of their research for the unit. The homework for Year 10 students will be both practical and theory based. Students will be expected to gather relevant images and information from the internet, as well as from magazines, newspapers, leaflets and postcards.

Assessment is rigorous and each student is given an A3 outline to the course which enables the teacher to track the progress of each student through verification of work done and comment marking.

There will be regular moderation within the department that uses the Exam Board (EdExcel) criteria.

We expect 100% of students to have made at least 4 full levels of progress in Art by the end of Year 11 (based on data from the start of Year 7).
