Hearing the stories of people who are reflective of our modern society will encourage the development of students' intellectual, spiritual, social, emotional and cultural understanding. Running alongside this exploration of literature is a focus on supporting students to develop a firm grasp on fundamental writing skills such as syntax, grammar, lexical choice and rhetoric. Knowing how to confidently craft different forms of writing from a well-structured argument to creative storytelling empowers students to address different audiences for different purposes.

At Swanlea School, students are equipped with the tools to communicate their ideas and emotions and to understand the world around them; this strong foundation in English ultimately serves as a key to unlock their wider journey through education and beyond.
